
PART 22: LESSONS FROM PAUL'S VISIT TO ATHENS

MAIN IDEA

By observing <u>how</u> Paul evangelized the influential city of Athens, we find some important lessons about engaging unbelievers today.

I. BACKGROUND

A. Athens

- The religious center of Greece
- Virtually every god known to man could be worshipped there.
- Paul viewed Athens as a city of lost humanity, all doomed to a Christless eternity because of rampant pagan idolatry.

B. Epicureans

- Epicureans believed that the chief purpose of man was to achieve happiness.
- Man has free will to plan and live a life of pleasure.
- Eat, drink, and be merry for tomorrow you die.

C. Stoics

- Stoics believe the chief purpose in life was to reach a place of indifference to pleasure and pain.
- To understand life, one must deny emotions and feelings which can get in the way of finding truth,

D. Areopagus

- A prominent a rocky hill of the god Ares, or Mars.
- The name of the council which met on Mar's hill to question the rights of teachers who lectured in public.
- Paul was not on trial here; he was only being asked to defend his teaching.

II. HOW PAUL EVANGELIZED ATHENS

- A. He <u>recognized</u> their situation (17:16)
- B. He reasoned with them (17:17-21)
 - He reasoned with Jews, Greeks, and those in the marketplace
 - He reasoned with Epicurean and Stoic philosophers
 - He reasoned with them at the Areopagus
- C. He <u>revealed</u> God to them (17:22-31)
 - God is the Creator (17:24)
 - God is the Sustainer of life (17:25)
 - God is the Ruler of the nations (17:26)
 - God is knowable (17:27)
 - God is the Father of humanity (17:28-29)
 - God is both Judge and Rescuer (17:30-31)
- D. He <u>received</u> a mixed response (17:32)
